#### 3.0 Introduction new members

## 4.0 Business arising

Angus Howell asked that the advisory group recognise and congratulate Sue Brumby on her recent Victorian Regional and Community award for work in rural and farmer health.

Martin Butler also advised that Sue awarded the first ever Inaugural Rural Social Work Scholarship to Tess La Fontaine. Please note that the scholarship is named the Martin P Butler Rural Social Work scholarship recognising Martins extensive work in this area.

## 5.0 Current program status

As reported (refer to meeting PowerPoint presentation) on website

Bruce Gibson asked whether SFF had carried out any analysis as the size of farming business's so that we could ascertain who could actually release themselves from the farm business to attend SFF workshops. To note: *SFF does not obtain that data*.

Jenk Akyalcin (Dept of Health) discussed the importance of finding a solution to the long term sustainability of the SFF program and how the program can be institutionalised within health agencies. It was suggested that we need to continue to raise the profile of the SFF work and how we need to get the data to the health services – so that DHS can in turn use the data as an evidence base for their own organisations. Jenk suggested that regional DHS data may be more helpful

FOR NOTING	Currently SFF sends to health services that undertake 2 or more SFF programs a full report on their health data. This is sent to both the CEO and the SFF Health Professional with an accompanying letter.
FOR ACTION:	Cate Mercer-Grant to develop a regional DHS report commencing with Grampians and Hume and seek feedback from Jenk. Then seek regional DHS report for the program.  Also how the 'train the trainer' program can be built up as part of staff development within the health agency training budgets.

The report was well received particularly Slide 22 representing the baseline data, the increase in capacity, the actions and then the positive effects.

Discussion arose over the concerns noted by the report, particularly in regard to paperwork. Upon further discussion as raised by John Martin it was noted by Jacqueline that this was expressed by the health professionals <u>not</u> the farmers/participants.

A key item for SFF to take away is how to turn the expressed concerns from Health Professionals around to recognise the data collection as a key strength of the program, particularly in relation to:

- Evidence based practice
- Evaluation of the program as a continuum
- Good quality practice feeding back to the program

Stu Willder noted that the programs where this is more of an issue is where the health professionals are not as well organised as they should be which puts pressure on the program and the data collection

Cate Mercer-Grant to follow up some of the concerns raised and look at how SFF can promote these as strengths of the program.
