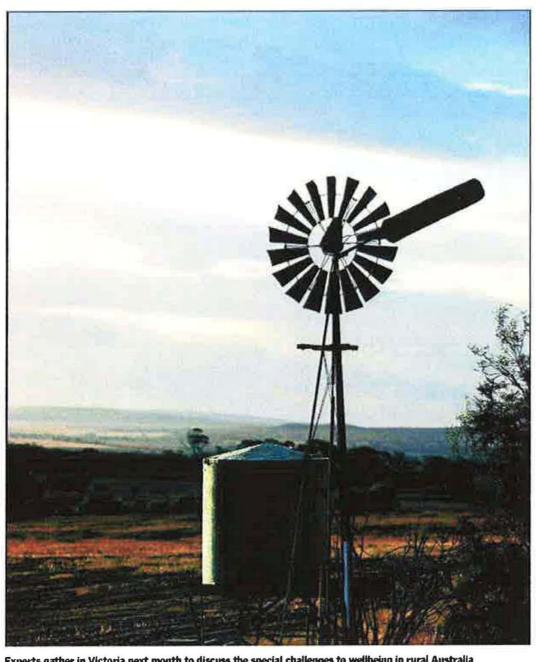
Professor Brumby said the conference is making a strong effort to cover every aspect of life in rural and farming Australia.
