Farm families project wins \$250,000 grant

Western District Health Service and its research partners are the recipients of the first major community development grant

from the Gardiner Foundation.

The Sustainable Dairy Farming Families (SDFF) project has been awarded \$250,000 over three years from the foundation, the major funder of this

\$649,000 project.
Western District Health Service chief executive western District health Service their executive officer, Jim Fletcher, said the project would build on the Rural Industries Research Development Corporation-funded Sustainable Farming Families project, currently in the second year of this three-year project, and would be at the leading edge in terms of a collaborative approach to focusing on health issues in rural farming communities.

"It also provides another opportunity for Western District Health Service and its staff to have leader-ship involvement in another major new health and

research initiative."

Ms Brumby, Director Community Services and SDFF project leader at Western District Health Service, Sue Brumby said:

"We are pleased that the Gardiner Foundation has recognised the importance of the health and well being of farmers in the dairy industry and chose to

"The SDFF project will involve 200 dairy farmers, men and women, from across Victoria in a three year study that focuses on farming family health and well being and its impact on farm safety and the farming business."

grant gives to farming family health builds on the
previous work we have been doing over the last six
years in men's health."
