

Sustainable Farm Families

The good health of the farmer and the farm family is the most important investment a farming enterprise can have.

This was the key message of the award-winning Sustainable Farm Families project, conducted in Yarrawonga last Monday and Tuesday.

Twenty-two local farmers came together to participate in the program, each undergoing a physical health check to assess blood sugar levels, cholesterol, body mass index, waist-hip ratio, blood pressure and a full physical assessment.

The program involved a two-day workshop, followed by annual workshops over the next two years. Over the two days, participants were provided

with practical information on the importance of good health, health and safety and its link to productivity of the farming business.

Community Health Nurse and program facilitator, Sue Crowther was pleased with the response by local farmers to the program.

"The SFF program

provided a wonderful opportunity for farming families in the Yarrawonga area to take positive action about their health," she said.

The key to this successful SFF program was the partnerships that were formed with a local farm industry group; Yarrawonga Community Health Centre and the

Yarrawonga Victorian Farmers Federation joining forces to bring the program to Yarrawonga.

Branch secretary, Helene Ryan worked tirelessly in the months preceding the program to encourage and recruit participants for the program.

The Yarrawonga program also provided valua-

ble experience for other health professionals from across the shire to learn about the project so that further programs can be conducted in the future.

Yarrawonga was successful in receiving seed funding to conduct the program following a joint submission with the Moira Health Alliance. Sustainable Farm Families is an initiative of Western District Health Service Hamilton and the Department of Human Services in collaboration with Yarrawonga District Health Service and the Victorian Farmers Federation.
