Introduction

- Interprofessional Collaboration (IPC) foundation of future reform for Australian health care.
- Chronic Disease Care expected to consume 80% of the health budget in the future.
- Australian health & social care students gain IPC knowledge in their courses and need opportunities to participate or observe IPC in the practice setting.
- Health & Social care Interprofessional Network (HSIN), a MUDRIH initiative, works with current rural Victorian health care providers to bridge the IPC knowledge gap.

- provides rural healthcare practitioners with opportunities to develop their knowledge, skills & practice in IPC.
- assists practitioners:
 - develop confidence in dealing with students from multiple disciplines within their working environment;
 - in developing interprofessional facilitation skills to work effectively with mixed groups of health students, or professionals; &
 - ♦ in building Interprofessional team capacity through improved communication, cooperation and collaboration strategies.
