## Empowering the next generation of agricultural workers

## Agriculture and farming is widely recognised as one of the most dangerous industries in Australia.

77%

of students first started working/helping on farm before 15 years of age



of students rate their own health and safety practices on farm as very or extremely important



Young people aged 15-34 years are increasingly involved in agriculture, either through paid or unpaid work [1]. Exposure to farm related health and safety hazards continues to significantly increase the risk of our young people experiencing short or long term illness associated with agriculture exposures or being killed, injured or permanently disabled.

The Gear Up for Ag Health & Safety program recognises young people are central to an innovative and sustainable future for agriculture and seeks to influence farm safety culture. The program provides an opportunity for students to reflect on their current farm safety practices and discuss important health and safety topics. Students are engaged in learning through various demonstrations and interactive activities to build their understanding of common agricultural hazards, promote health and wellbeing and empower them to improve their farm safety practices.

32% do not wear respiratory protection when working in a dusty environment

26% do not wear gloves when mixing, handling or applying chemicals

76%

of students have been exposed to loud noise in farm work over the last 12 months

of students report experiencing ringing in ears or decreased ability to hear after being exposed to loud noise

WHAT'S INCLUDED?	<ul> <li>A pre-program student survey to develop customised training and provide key health and safety education relevant to student's attitudes, behaviour, knowledge and exposures, at home and on the farm.</li> <li>An education session that promotes health, wellbeing and safety in agriculture including interactive demonstrations and class activities. This includes identification of local agricultural hazards, how working on farms and in agriculture can impact physical and mental wellbeing and ways to minimise risk of fatality, injury and illness on farms.</li> <li>A post-program student survey to gauge learning and effectiveness of the program and report back to the participating school.</li> </ul>
PPE KIT	• Each student is provided with a Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) start-up kit including discussion on where and when to wear appropriate AS/NZS approved PPE and interactive demonstration of correct usage.
